“I am the vine, you are the branches,” Jesus tells us in today’s Gospel passage. This is not a way of speaking but a wonderful reality, for at our baptism we have been grafted onto him. It is thanks to our deep union with Jesus that we can enjoy God’s salvation and produce the fruits worthy of our new life in him.

Jesus’ statement that “apart from him we can do nothing” may hurt our pride, but it is the sober truth. Only those who accept it in all humility and live accordingly can experience the joy of being God’s children, and are in the best position to produce an abundance of fruits unto eternal life.

All–Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you,

we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father.

Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. LITURGY OF THE WORD



1st Reading Acts 9:26-31

After his conversion, Paul did not have an easy life, but the Lord watched over him, as we learn from the passage we are about to hear proclaimed.

R —A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

When Saul arrived in Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him, not believing that he was a disciple.

Then Barnabas took charge of him and brought him to the apostles, and he reported to them how he had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken to him, and how in Damascus he had spoken out boldly in the name of Jesus.

Saul moved about freely with them in Jerusalem, and spoke out boldly in the name of the Lord. He also spoke and debated with the Hellenists, but they tried to kill him. And when the brothers learned of this, they took him down to Caesarea and sent him on his way to Tarsus.

The Church throughout all Judea, Galilee, and Samaria was at peace. It was being built up and walked in the fear of the Lord, and with the consolation of the Holy Spirit it grew in numbers.

Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him.

And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us. Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit

he gave us.

Gospel Jn 15:1-8

The allegory of the vine and the branches illustrates the vital relationship that exists between Jesus and us. It also emphasizes the need for us to live in communion with him.

P —The Lord be with you!

All—And with your spirit!

P —A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

All—Glory to you, O Lord!

Jesus said to his disciples: “I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine grower. He takes away every branch in me that does not bear fruit, and every one that does, he prunes so that it bears more fruit.

You are already pruned because of the word that I spoke to you. Remain in me, as I remain in you. Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you, unless you remain in me.

I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing. Anyone who does not remain in me will be thrown out like a branch and wither. People will gather them and throw them into a fire and they will be burned.

If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you. By this is my Father glorified, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.”

Profession of Faith

(Apostles' Creed)

C —That all those who receive holy Communion may strengthen their union with Christ through a life of service to their neighbor, let us pray! *R.*

C —That all those who are at the point of death may cling to Jesus as their sole source of hope and salvation, let us pray! *R.*

P —Lord Jesus, full of trust in the help of your grace, we renew

our commitment to reject whatever can separate us from you and our neighbor. Keep us one with you as you are one with the Father and the Holy Spirit, for ever and ever.

In Touch or Attached?

We ought to discard the word “cell-phone” nowadays. First, it has become anything but a mere phone. And the word “cellular” has lost its appeal and original meaning. Cellular connotes a geographical area covered by a cell site that is awash in radio frequency waves. Phones nowadays are mostly internet-based. And it has become a multi-use gadget. Calendar. Planner. Camera. CCTV. Translator. And a whole lot more!

It has become an appendage to the body, much like a hand or a foot is. Giggling girls inside malls (and everywhere else) always carry that gadget. TikTok-crazed teens gyrate and gesticulate in Church patios, in front of K-Kopi or Juan Café counters, inside Starbucks or dance their merry time away at Dunkin’s.

The videocam phone does more than keep one in touch. It is very simply attached to our bodies and touches every single aspect of our individual and communal (read: digital) lives. PLDT should now re-think their famous, so-80s by-line “keeping you in touch.”

And here’s the best part. The Lord’s words today say more than simply being in touch. “*I am the vine, you are the branches,*” is a statement of attachment, not doing shallow emoticon-mode touching base with him. It means being connected, 24/7, spiritually, bodily, sacramentally, totally. In other more traditional words, it means loving God with one’s whole heart, mind, soul, and body!

Do not just keep in touch. Be connected. Be attached!



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
