Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen!

Thus says the Lord: You, Bethlehem-Ephrathah, too small to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one who is to be ruler in Israel; whose origin is from of old, from ancient times.

The Lord will give them up, until the time when she who is to give birth has borne, and the rest of his kindred shall return to the children of Israel.

He shall stand firm and shepherd his flock by the strength of the Lord, in the majestic name of the Lord, his God. And they shall remain, for now his greatness shall reach to the ends of the earth.

Homily

GLOSSARY: • <u>Bethlehem</u>: A town in the southern region of Palestine called Judah, and later Judea. The name means "House of Bread." It was the native place of David, and according to the prophecy of Micah, it was also destined to be the birthplace of the Messiah. In fact, due to the census ordered by the Roman Emperor, Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem, though Mary, his mother, and Joseph, his foster father, resided in Nazareth. • <u>Ephrathah</u>: The burial place of Rachel, wife of Jacob and mother of Joseph, the viceroy of Egypt. The prophet Micah identifies Ephrathah with Bethlehem, the place of origin of Jesse, the father of David, and the town where the Messiah was to be born. (See Mi 5:1 and Mt 2:5-6.) • <u>Holocausts:</u> Victims offered in sacrifice and totally consumed by fire. • <u>Sin offerings:</u> Sacrifices offered in atonement for sins.

Profession of Faith

(Nicene-Constantinopolitan Creed) All—I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible.

I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. DOING GOD'S WILL

Thristmas has been filling the air since September 1, thanks in part to Jose Mari Chan.

We are trying mighty hard in Church to be counter-cultural ... to almost no avail!

And since today, you have chosen to be here at Mass with the rest of the Church all over the world, we might as well set aside first all this Christmas excitement and drink in to the full the riches of this last Sunday of Advent – the last before we move over to Christmas day and the short Christmas season.

One way to do this is to look for an icon, a living image that epitomizes for us what Advent stands for in its subtle richness and meaningfulness.

I suggest we look at Mary as one such icon. After all, the very liturgy itself offers no less than her as object of our reflection in today's Gospel passage.


Mary went to do an errand of charity, we are told. She "went in haste to a hill country of Judea," to assist Elizabeth, who herself, was with child in her old age.

The recent feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe (Dec.12), Patroness of the Americas, can offer us some food for thought in line with this. There appear to be some clear parallelisms between the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth and the visitation of Mary to an insignificant man named Juan Diego. Mary was with child when she went to where Elizabeth was. Mary appeared with child when she appeared to Juan Diego, too. Mary, was literally "llena de gracia," full of grace, for she was filled with the author of grace. She carried the author of grace in her womb. Our Lady of Guadalupe, in the image she wanted to be remembered – the image etched indelibly on Juan Diego's cloak, shows her to be "with child." People who go around with the intention of helping others, being with others, and doing good to others, like Mary, never go emptyhanded. They always carry something with them. They always bring more than just them-

selves. People who are busy lifting the burdens of others really come laden with the gift of them-

selves, the riches of their personhood, the full-

ness of their gracious selves, ready and willing

to share whatever riches that are in them. Mary was such a visitor both in Zechariah's house, and Juan Diego's simple, little, insignificant world! Mary went to Elizabeth with more than just a wish to help. Mary went to Elizabeth's side full of love and laden with something she could not contain – the fruit of the good news she herself has received. "Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall name him Jesus." Mary was full of the good news that was taking flesh inside her. Mary was filled with a promise slowly but surely unfolding in a very real sense in her person.

Mary, the first to be evangelized, was also, in turn, the first evangelizer! She went to Judea bringing good news. She went to Judea to DO the good news... to help out a cousin in need. At Tepeyac, Mary did exactly the same. She came pregnant with the Good News, too. She was filled with a message at once so endearing and nurturing, not only to Juan Dieguito, but to all that that little insignificant man stood for. She came bringing good news of salvation to the poor, the outcasts, the downtrodden! La Guadalupana les ama a los pobres, los sencillos, los humildes de esta tierra! The Lady of Guadalupe has come to bring good news, not to the mighty, but to the lowly and the humble. Like John the Baptist, too, she has come to fill in the low places, and level the humps and bumps in the lives of people in this valley of tears. Full of grace, she filled in for what was lacking in Elizabeth's – and our – lives! People experience various types of "fullness"

these days. Malls are full of people. People's calendars are filled with one activity after another. While wallets get emptied real fast and budgets maxxed out, people are filled with expectant joy and at least material happiness.

But being filled alone, might not translate to being full!

Mary, *La Guadalupana*, was "*llena de gracia*," full of grace, even as her days at Judea were filled with chores to do. She, too, had her share of busy days helping out her cousin. Filled with things to do, she was above all full of that which was most important, what Jesus told Martha as she complained – "*only one thing is necessary!*" (Lk 10:42)

Today, with only a few days left before Christmas, we might want to give a look at what fills our thoughts, minds and hearts. What is it that sits on our mind all day? What is it that concerns us the most? Are we just waiting to be filled, or are we working towards genuine, lasting fullness—the sort that comes with doing the will of God, the kind that results in deep fulfillment.

Mary shows us the way. So does the letter writer to the Hebrews, who reminds us that it is not necessarily sacrifice and offering that pleases God, but the real and active resolve to fulfill a promise we would do well to be reminded of: "Behold, I come to do your will, O God!" (Hebrews 10:7).
